Tralee Chamber Alliance



Tralee Chamber Alliance focuses on promoting the town's business community to attract more jobs and opportunities. Its core goal is to foster industrial growth and enhance community pride. The board consists of 20 local business and community leaders, with sectors including Town Image, Retail, Parking, Planning, Enterprise, Employment, and Tourism & Marketing. They aim to boost tourism, promote a positive attitude, and present a strong, positive image of Tralee.

Tralee Tidy Towns CE Scheme



The Tralee Tidy Towns group works with Kerry County Council and other organizations to keep Tralee clean, litter-free, and presentable. The group consists of people committed to improving the town, carrying out daily maintenance tasks such as painting and litter picking. Their goal is to improve Tralee's standing in the Tidy Towns competition. Participants receive industry-standard training in manual handling, safe pass, and other related courses.

Rathass Cemetery CE Scheme Tralee



Rathass Cemetery, the largest graveyard in Kerry and the main burial site for Tralee, dates from the early medieval Christian period, with earlier significance suggested by the Ogham Stone. The cemetery is maintained under the Rathass Cemetery CE Scheme, which works with Kerry County Council to keep it clean and presentable. Participants receive industry-standard training in manual handling, safe pass, pesticide distribution, and other environmental courses.

Kerry Travellers Health and Development Project



Established in 1997, the project recognizes the distinct culture of the Traveller Community. Participants work as community link workers or information officers, organizing group meetings, supporting integration into full-time work or education, and ensuring community members are well-informed about all project activities, events, and opportunities. They also collaborate closely with the project administrator and assist with the daily operations, administration, and management of the office.

Adapt Kerry - Women's Refuge and Support Services



Founded in the early 1990s by parents in Tralee supporting their daughters through domestic violence, ADAPT Kerry was established to address the lack of services in the county. After fundraising for a refuge, the group was incorporated in 1992 and officially opened in 1996 to provide a safe, supportive space for women and children affected by domestic violence. ADAPT Kerry aims to offer essential support to female victims and their children while raising awareness of this important issue.

Tralee Community Bridge Club



The Tralee Bridge Club offers a welcoming space for bridge enthusiasts to come together and participate in either a competitive or casual setting. The group meets most weeknights and is open to people of all ages and skill levels, from beginners to seasoned players. The only prerequisite for joining is a love for bridge! Participants will embrace the club's ethos of fostering a fun yet competitive environment, providing an opportunity for people to meet, socialize, and enjoy playing the game they love.

Tralee Pitch and Putt Club



Established in 1969, the Tralee Pitch and Putt Club provides a space for enthusiasts to enjoy the game in a relaxing setting. Located in a peaceful area, away from the town's hustle, the club is open to the public with membership options and green fee rates for visitors or occasional players. Participants will receive training in course management, landscape maintenance, and health & safety certification, along with providing guidance in event and venue management.

Austin Stacks GAA Club



Austin Stacks is a GAA club in Tralee serving nearly 40 teams and 500 members. The Connolly Park complex requires ongoing maintenance, and participants will be trained in field maintenance, event management, and ABLE's training schemes, gaining certification in greenkeeping, general maintenance, and caretaking. This partnership with a local volunteer organization demonstrates the community integration central to the success of Community Employment.

John Mitchels GAA Club



John Mitchels GAA Club, based in Tralee, County Kerry, is a historic club with a strong presence in Gaelic football and hurling. Named after Irish nationalist John Mitchel, it has a rich tradition of success and community involvement. The club offers opportunities for all ages, from youth to senior teams, and is known for producing talented players for county-level teams. With a focus on teamwork and skill development, John Mitchels GAA Club plays a key role in Tralee's sporting culture.
